


RESULTS FROM THE HSKI-C FEDERAL REVIEW



GLCAC Head Start/Early Head Start will implement an outcomes based family engagement model



Child Outcomes for School Readiness Goals 2015-2016

Social Emotional, Approaches to Learning and Language & Communication reflected consistent growth in achievement. Perceptual, Motor & Physical Health & Development demonstrated the most growth.

These outcomes reflect the achievement of all children in the Early Head Start and Head Start program, inclusive of children with diagnosed disabilities. The children were engaged in innovative educational experiences where they explored concepts such as the Study of the Tree and a winter unit including *Migration and Hibernation*.




Family Outcomes

As part of our strategic plan goals, our program offered various opportunities for workforce and family development. Families demonstrated growth in all domains across the board based on the baseline (first home visit) up to the third assessment. We were happy to see increases in the quality of interaction and communication between parent and child, as well as engagement in transition plans and activities. Other workforce development programs include English as Second Language (ESL) classes, Driver's Permit, Citizenship Preparation, and Financial Literacy (Budget Buddies).






FAMILY ENGAGEMENT INITIATIVES

Results of parent's perception of how the activities contributed to the enhancement of their child's educational development are linked with the Family Outcomes:










PARENT ENGAGEMENT IN HEALTH


Parents were invited to participate in a Health Literacy Workshop with the goal of increasing confidence in managing common childhood illnesses and ailments at home. Parents were surveyed before and after the workshop.

As a result of the workshop, more parents were willing to consult a book to obtain medical information for their children after the training.
